In governance and peacebuilding, we advanced transparency and accountability of institutions through the adoption of anti-corruption measures, policies and tools. Safety and security were strengthened by addressing illegal possession, misuse and trafficking of firearms and ammunition, as well as access to justice for all, and inter-community dialogue.

Social cohesion and trust-building was fostered through the preservation of cultural heritage and engagement of youth, with the aim to further improve inter-community acceptance and respect for the cultural identity and heritage of all communities. UNDP worked closely with youth, empowering them to be agents of change to foster dialogue and trust building among communities.


In the area of Inclusive Growth and Climate resilience, UNDP enhanced institutional capacities for the design, and adoption of the first and voluntary determined contributions. Our work contributed to the design and implementation of climate actions, sustainable urban mobility, and the promotion of energy efficiency initiatives at the central and local level.

Our work in the promotion of the creative industries sector fostered partnerships with the private sector and supported the first ever Creative Economy strategy. The Economic Resilience Programme, and its flagship tools and methodologies, was launched in 2024, and assisted 40 MSMEs enhance their resilience, improve their business models and sustainability. 40% of these businesses were women-led.

Gender Equality, Digital transformation and Human Rights remained core to our mission. "Stand-Up Comedy for Social Change" implemented as part of the 16 days of activism, fostered dialogue and inspired action. To enhance digital transformation, UNDP ensured digital mainstreaming throughout its programme and developed tools and platforms to enhance the efficiency and transparency of institutions. A Digital Readiness Assessment at the local level and a comprehensive Digital Profile were initiated. Human rights were integrated into our work to ensure the non-majority communities, the vulnerable and the most marginalised benefit from all interventions.

I extend my deepest gratitude to our partners and donors. Your trust, support, and collaboration were key to every achievement. While challenges remain, our shared determination and vision for development guide us forward.

Democratic Governance and Peacebuilding

Efforts to **combat corruption** are central to **strengthening governance**, improving **institutional integrity**, and promoting **justice**. By enhancing **transparency** and **accountability**, UNDP has aimed to create lasting change through targeted reforms and public awareness initiatives.

Established the **Asset Recovery Office (ARO)** – a specialized body to trace and recover hidden assets stolen through corruption and financial crime which has resulted in the successful retrieval of illicit funds.

Strengthened institutions through developing a code of ethics and disciplinary procedures for court appointed experts. In addition, enhanced transparency through a new digital solution for political parties to report financial contributions and expenditures and developed an e-notary platform and e-database for the management of seized assets.



Raised public engagement and awareness through investigative journalism and public reporting of allegations of corruption through KALLXO.com (500 allegations filed, 8,000 articles published, and the broadcast of 4 TV series of "The Prosecution"







Contributed to enhanced **public safety** and security through the destruction of hundreds of illegal small arms and light weapons (SALW), and the **strengthening of security institutions**, while maintaining our role as the key partner in the sector.

community policing officers were trained in SALW control and domestic violence response.

UNDP supported the advancement of access to justice and language rights by improving legal systems and supporting digital tools in collaboration with key stakeholders.





130,000 old minor offence cases were registered online in 2024.

A **court archive system** was established in seven Basic Courts, with cases registered online in partnership with the **Judicial Council**.



Supported the implementation of the Law on Languages through the digitization of court files and digital translation services.

Provided Braille display equipment for a Professional Legal Associate in the Basic Court of Gjakovë/ Dakovica, facilitating the drafting of court judgments, legal research, and providing legal opinions on cases.





A **Fair in Janjevë/Janjevo** was organized to celebrate culture and heritage, showcase the rehabilitation of the houses, and provide entrepreneurs a platform to display and sell their products.



65 households were connected to the new system of water supply and sewerage.



88 beneficiaries (87% women) were given entrepreneurship skills, and trained in traditional crafts, sewing, embroidery, candle/resin accessory making, tour guiding, and permaculture.



20 grants were awarded to businesses and entrepreneurs from diverse backgrounds.



15 women registered with the Employment Office.

Cultural heritage preservation plays a key role in fostering **economic growth**, **community development**, and **social cohesion**. Through targeted interventions, UNDP has made significant strides in safeguarding heritage and creating **sustainable opportunities** for local communities.



14 houses identified as being in critical need of intervention were identified for restoration. **8 houses** have been fully restored, while **6 are nearly complete.**



3 sites including public, religious, and privately-owned cultural heritage sites were selected for emergency/consolidation interventions with works to start in 2025.

All initiatives contributed to income generation and reduced unemployment risk.

A **study visit to Türkiye** was organized for professionals from cultural heritage institutions aimed at expanding their expertise in sustainable museum and archaeological practices.

UNDP worked to strengthen accountability, effectiveness, transparency, and genderresponsiveness in institutions by supporting transitional justice, legal services for conflict-related sexual violence (CRSV) survivors, and regional cooperation among key justice sector stakeholders.





Equipped 26 police officers with knowledge and skills to effectively research, investigate, and report on genderconflict-sensitive and issues.

Engaged **209 participants** in Youth Peace Camps, Harmony Talks and two joint community initiatives in the Mitrovicë/a region with focus on youth engagement in peacebuilding, reconciliation. and inter-ethnic dialogue.

Organized 2 regional conferences bringing together 80 representatives of the justice sector and victim support institutions from the Western Balkans.

Hosted 1 Regional Transitional Justice Seminar gathering 40 participants from Prishtinë/Priština and Belgrade providing a vital platform for dialogue

understanding.



Provided legal and psychosocial support to 89 CRSV survivors, including 63 women and 26 men.

8 justice representatives deepened their regional understanding and exchange valuable experiences.



Over 5200+ people interviewed, with 50% of respondents being women.




Public Pulse Analysis on the Effects of Visa Liberalization on Migration

UNDP continued to address the legacy of conflict through workshops and initiatives that support **psychosocial well-being** and **promote inclusion** in Transitional Justice processes.





Several workshops and meetings were held to enhance the psychosocial wellbeing of affected individuals.





A workshop was organized to introduce student grant beneficiaries from the "University of Prishtina" to foundational concepts of transitional justice.

Over 150,000 pages

documenting the conflict were digitized, organized, and securely stored in a digital archive.





10 Local Community UN Volunteers

from diverse backgrounds, were placed in media organizations, in a tailored internship programme for young journalists developed together with UNFPA. Seven were sustained in their placements, and two joined UNDP's environmental justice project.

A campaign against misinformation reached

100,000 people

featuring prominent women journalists and media editors from diverse communities.





243 young women and men with disabilities (intellectual and physical) benefited from project sports activities, including at regional level, strengthening inclusion, equality and trust.



256 young women and men were empowered to intervene in hate speech situations, contributing to a safer and more inclusive environment.

With **environmental justice** as an entry point, the office has been using **inter-community dialogue** to promote **trust-building** and **social cohesion** among multi-ethnic communities (at the local and central levels, including the Ombudsperson).



Inclusive Growth and Climate Promise

UNDP empowered local communities to tackle climate change by **building capacities**, implementing **sustainable urban planning actions**, and fostering **green solutions** for long-term resilience.

We have laid the ground for transformational work in climate action, by supporting the development of the first and **voluntary determined contributions**, initiating the support to the formulation of the Climate Adaptation Strategy, and facilitating the Climate Change Council.

New financial contributions towards achieving the first and voluntary determined contributions have already been committed for 2025.

- members of the Climate Change Council and the first and voluntary determined contributions Working Group were trained in gender and social considerations, as well as improving monitoring mechanisms.
 - people in Prizren and Suharekë/Suva Reka trained on the drivers of climate change and their local impacts.



Prizren and Suharekë/ Suva Reka adopted **Sustainable Urban Mobility Plans (SUMPs)** for 2024–2034, setting the stage for climate-responsive urban planning, including green investments and smart transport development.

Greenhouse gas emissions were reduced in urban and rural areas through:

- 8 solar photovoltaic systems across three public buildings.
- women-led micro, small, and medium enterprises in Prizren and Suharekë/Suva Reka. These systems generate 172.22 MWh of electricity annually and help avoid 3,970 tons of CO2 emissions each year.
- 2 women-led micro, small, and medium enterprises received smart energy efficiency equipment, further contributing to energy savings.

UNDP worked to tackle climate change by focusing on **energy, adaptation,** and **resilience**, while **advancing innovation** to drive investments in the **green transition**.

42 MSMEs

participated in the **BOOST acceleration programme**, receiving training and financial support for green business growth.

Trained **5 Solar Panel Installers** to integrate the Solar Installation module into Vocational Training Centers, promoting green recovery and sustainable development.

Provided equipment for **solar panel** installation training in five regional VTCs.

Marked **Earth Day** with the art installation "**The Wall** or the Tilted Promise," as a strong representation of the environmental challenges we face.

UNDP contributed to **sustainable urban development** through innovative initiatives that promote **environmental awareness, inclusivity,** and **resilience.**



Prishtinë/Pristina's first **Urban Talk** held during the **Earth Day** celebrations, featured regional and local experts discussing sustainable urban growth, construction's environmental impact, and the recycling of construction waste.



An **Outdoor Movie Festival,** lasting two weeks, was organized, drawing around **600 viewers**, including vulnerable families.

UNDP promoted **local democracy** and **partnerships** across the Western Balkans by **empowering youth, responding to labour market needs,** and **improving municipal governance.**



32 Projects

were supported, including 14 initiatives specifically focused on youth empowerment.

75 Young Women and Men

benefited from internship schemes lasting three to 12 months, gaining valuable experience and skills.

24 Municipal Officials

improved their project cycle management skills to enhance local governance effectiveness.

28 Local Stakeholders

participated in three regional conferences, fostering collaboration between local institutions and civil society across the Western Balkans.





In 2024, the "E du Prizrenin" campaign evolved into a comprehensive tourism resource, spotlighting 15 additional cultural, historical, and natural attractions in Prizren.







New features, including "Authentically Prizren," "Plan Your Vacation," and "Things to Do," were introduced to enhance the visitor experience.

The "E du Prizrenin" mobile app, now live on Google Play and the Apple App Store, offers key resources such as:

- Information on historical sites and outdoor activities.
- Accommodation and gastronomy options.
- Events planned for 2025.
- Practical guidance for tourists.



UNDP has been supporting the **creative economy** by promoting **innovation**, facilitating **economic growth**, and contributing to **sustainable development** through strategic initiatives, investments, and capacity-building.



A **Creative Economy strategy** is being supported to guide long-term growth and development in the sector.

Initial findings from the report on "Skills Needs and Gaps in Creative Industries" provided critical insights to shape workforce development.

An Investment Promotion Plan was prepared to attract new financial resources for creative industries.

A regulation for cash rebates in film production was enacted to encourage investment and attract international productions.

A Roadmap on Intellectual Property Rights was introduced to strengthen protections and promote innovation in the sector.

Supported the organization of key conferences, including "Shifting Perspectives: Creatives Driving Economic Change" and the "Prishtina Music Conference."

10 start-ups were supported to develop innovative prototypes and minimum viable products in collaboration with academic institutions.

LEAVING NO ONE BEHIND

UNDP embraces the fundamental "**Leave No One Behind**" principle to ensure inclusive and equitable development across all its programmes and projects. This principle underscores UNDP's commitment to reaching the most marginalized and vulnerable groups, addressing systemic barriers, and fostering an environment where every individual has the opportunity to thrive.



UNDP strengthened institutional capacities for transformative change by providing expert support, technical assistance, and capacity building to central institutions for the formulation of legal frameworks, strategic planning, digital transformation, policy development, and organizational efficiency, while also supporting local institutions with critical areas of development.

UNDP provided support to promote an **inclusive population** and **housing census** that reached vulnerable groups, whilst providing technical support, and facilitating the usage of **digital tools**.

A Resource Centre for Students with Visual Impairments was established and equipped at the "University of Prishtina", providing access to learning materials for an inclusive education.



To mark the **16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence (GBV),**UNDP introduced a novel approach to address this most pressing issue through **2 Stand-Up Comedy.**

THE 2 STAND-UP COMEDY SHOWS

were hosted in Albanian and Serbian, ensuring broader reach and inclusivity. It proved to be a powerful tool focusing on serious social issues in an accessible, engaging, and thought-provoking way. By blending humour with awareness, the shows challenged stereotypes, inspired empathy, and sparked discussions about gender-based violence.

They exposed the absurdity of societal biases that perpetuate GBV, shared relatable experiences that highlight how small actions contribute to systemic issues, and amplified women's voices while celebrating resilience.







Through **digital transformation** initiatives, individuals have gained essential digital skills that enhance employability, local digital readiness has been assessed, and inclusive access to technology has been ensured.



3500 Households

were surveyed through a Digital Household Survey, which served to analyse the digital landscape including ownership of digital equipment, usage of digital tools, digital literacy, digital safety and more.

231 Young Women and Men

developed labour market-relevant digital skills through boot camps in mobile application, web development, data engineering, networking, digital marketing, and digital design.

100 Young Women

were trained to excel in remote digital jobs. Trainings covered digital literacy, online work skills, financial literacy, entrepreneurship, soft skills, and career development.

120 Individuals

from various communities, benefited from 2 Digital Skills Camp in different digital fields.
